We believe in providing lots of opportunities for children to explore their creativity through music, art and performance.

As children move through the school a variety of music tuition is available to them, either individually or in groups, and these children often come together to perform in the school orchestra. African drumming, guitar, flute, clarinet, piano, violin, brass, chime bars, recorder and choir all provide other way in to experience a love and enjoyment of music. Children perform at the Wycombe Swan, Royal Albert Hall and Wembley Arena.

We are lucky to employ a specialist art teacher to teach art across the school and who enables the children to produce artwork of a particularly high standard. It is great to see the pleasure and self-esteem that comes from these artistic endeavours.

Christmas productions, class assemblies and creative art performances are a regular feature of the school year allowing children the experience of performing to an audience.



Healthy Bodies, Healthy Minds

We have a long tradition at Butlers Court of ensuring a range of sport is available and accessible to the children. Skill development in PE lessons is thorough and comprehensive and after school clubs are wide ranging.

Competitions in local leagues are regularly arranged for our school teams in cricket, football, rugby, netball and athletics. Good sportsmanship, sporting etiquette and commending those that take part is always promoted and believe that many positive values are developed through sporting activities.

We also have several external providers who add to the mix of sports on offer after school, including tennis, cricket, gymnastics, football, rugby and cheerleading.

We actively promote children taking exercise every day and for those who find traditional sport challenging we encourage walking, cycling and scooting to school. With the majority of our families living close to the school this is an enjoyable and achievable goal.



We are fortunate to have well equipped school grounds and internal facilities. Children deserve to be educated in pleasant surroundings that give them a sense of pride.

With a dedicated library, dining room, art room, music room and several break-out spaces for small group learning the children have a wonderful environment in which to thrive. Our Early Years base is particularly well equipped with both indoor and outdoor space.

Starting School
